t was game five of the 1990 NBA championships. The Pistons

were up three games to one against the Portland Trailblazers as they chased a repeat championship title. With seconds left on the clock, Vinnie Johnson hit a game-winning shot that sealed the championship victory for the Bad Boys of the NBA. Vinnie was not a starter for the Pistons that year, but it cannot be denied that he played an important role in the championship series.

Can you think of someone who holds a special place in your heart?

What role did they play as they impacted your life?

Roles, whether in the church or the family, are one of the most

debated topics in the church today. Let's look to Scripture to learn what the roles are in Christ. Our main objective will then be to

understand God's big design for the family.

Galatians 3:28: There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is no male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus.

Romans 3:22-24: The righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe. For there is no distinction: 23 for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, 24 and are justified by his grace as a gift, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus.

What do these verses say about who we are to Jesus?
Are there any differences for who can come to Christ?
Why do you think God chose these topics (ethnicity, gender, positions) to explain the equality that we all have before Christ?

Jesus showed this equality while on the earth. He talked with the woman at the well in John Chapter 4. Not only was she a woman, but she was a Samaritan woman. According to verse 27, the open actions of Christ completely stunned his disciples.

To go even further, Jesus even put the Pharisees and the adulterous woman on the same level in John 8. When they brought

the woman before Jesus. He exclaimed that those who had no sin

could cast the first stone.
These Scriptures beg the question: Does this mean that roles are done away with in the Church and further on into the family?
Let's compare Scripture with Scripture
Ephesians 5:25-27: Husbands, love your wives, as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her, 26 that he might sanctify her, having cleansed her by the washing of water with the word, 27 so that he might present the church to himself in splendor, without spot or wrinkle or any such thing, that she might be holy and without blemish.
How does Paul describe the role of the husband to the church?

Ephesians 5:23-27:

For the husband is the head of the wife even as Christ is the head of the church, his body, and is himself its Savior. 24 Now as the church submits to Christ, so also wives should submit in everything to their husbands. 25 Husbands, love your wives, as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her, 26 that he might sanctify her, having cleansed her by the washing of water with the word, 27 so that he might present the church to himself in splendor, without spot

or wrinkle or any such thing, that she might be holy and

without blemish.
How does Paul describe the role of the wife to the church?

Ephesians 6:1-3:
Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. 2 "Honor your father and mother" (this is the first commandment with a promise), 3 "that it may go well with you and that you may live long in the land.

DEFINING THE FAMILY: DEVOTION 1

FAMILY?

What is Family? This question becomes very difficult to answer when we look at how families function in the twenty-first century. In the world we live in, the definition of family could mean many different things. Most of the time that definition is based upon what one individual thinks or feels it means to them. Just like everything else in life, the definition of family is no longer an objective one, but it has become subjective. The view and definition of what family is supposed to be has been distorted by sin and the opinions of man. If you have spent any amount of time watching television, reading the news, scrolling through Facebook, or listening to the things your children are taught at school, you know the world has created its own skewed view of how family is defined. Men marrying men, women marrying women, divorce used as a solution to "incompatibility" and a quick fix to disagreements, kids with five Christmases and a last name that is different from the rest, all of which are "okay" in the eyes of the world and even many Christians. We have let the views of the world seep in the church and redefine family for us. It's about time we step up and stick to the God-given definition of family!

God put the family in place in Genesis 2:18 when He said, "It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him a helper fit for him." Following this in verses 21-25 the Bible says, "So the Lord God caused a deep sleep to fall upon the man, and while he slept took one of his ribs and closed up its place with flesh. And the rib that the Lord God had taken from the man he made into a woman and brought her to the man. Then the man said, 'This at last is bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh; she shall be called Woman, because she was taken out of Man.' Therefore a man shall

leave his father and his mother and hold fast to his wife, and they shall become one flesh. And the man and his wife were both naked and were not ashamed." In Ephesians 5:31 God repeats Himself, "Therefore a man shall leave his father and mother and hold fast to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh." God designed family with the idea of man and woman coming together to be fruitful, multiply, and to raise those children in the training and instruction of the Lord.

God designed the family to be one man, one woman, and children. He designed it to be something that glorifies Him. He designed it with no divorce or separation, but to be a picture of Christ and His love for the church. He designed it to reflect our place in the family of God. Over the next couple of weeks let us put aside the world's definition and our own definition of what the family should look like and focus on how God defined and created the family to be.

HUSBANDS (DEFINED BY GOD)

he Dictionary is very simple when defining the word, "husband". As defined by Meriam-Webster, husband: a married man: the man someone is married to. Definitions are good; they help us to see what a word means, and give us the knowledge to use that word better. However, the mere definition of husband does not teach us what it means to BE a husband. When God defines husband, He tells us what it means to BE a husband. He shows us what our roles are, gives us instructions on how to act and treat our families, teaches us to adjust our attitudes and hearts, and defines for us our calling as "a married man: the man someone is married to."

One of my favorite and the most serious God given definitions/ commands for all husbands is found in Ephesians. Paul writes in Ephesians 5:25-30 "Husbands, love your wives, as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her, that he might sanctify her, having cleansed her by the washing of water with the word, so that he might present the church to himself in splendor, without spot or wrinkle or any such thing, that she might be holy and without blemish. In the same way husbands should love their wives as their own bodies. He who loves his wife loves himself. For no one ever hated his own flesh, but nourishes and cherishes it, just as Christ does the church, because we are members of his **body.**" The role and call are simple to hear but hard to live out. Husbands, love your wives. Loving our wives is not as easy as it sounds. It is something that I pray to get better at every day because I am constantly failing.

We are called to love our wives sacrificially, loving our wives as Christ loved the church and gave Himself up for her. Would you do anything for your wife? Where we often fall short of fulfilling this command is by placing our needs in front of the needs of our wives. If we are not willing to put our wives' needs in front of ours in the small things, then who is to say that we would be willing to give ourselves up for our wives?

One way that we as husbands (or, at least, myself) can be better at loving our wives is through sanctifying them. Not that we are God, and we have within ourselves the power to make our wives more like Christ, but we can help to make them more like Jesus by doing everything we can to promote holiness in the lives of our wives. Maybe that means spending time in prayer with our wives. Maybe it is spending time in God's Word with our wives or even serving with our wives. Being a husband means loving our wives in a way that makes them love Jesus more and grow closer to Him. Do we fit that description?

A GODLY WIFE

arriage is hard. 1 Corinthians 7:28 says, "Yet those who marry will have worldly troubles, and I would spare you that." Paul tells us that being married brings struggles that single people do not experience. He tells us again in verse 34 that "the unmarried or betrothed woman is anxious about the things of the Lord, how to be holy in body and spirit. But the married woman is anxious about worldly things, how to please her husband." This is important to understand. Marriage is hard. We face struggles as a married couple that we would never face single. As a wife, I often worry about what my husband needs. I worry about making him happy and supporting him. My attention is divided between my husband and God. Which Paul tells us will happen. It is the burden I take on by marrying. Struggles are normal. We cannot forget that we are sinful people, and sin brings hardships. There is another aspect of marriage that I often struggle with as well. This is something I think everyone struggles with, but it can affect marriage greatly. Divorces often happen based off this sin. The sin of pride.

One of the most controversial verses is found in Ephesians 5. Ephesians 5:22-24 says, "Wives, submit to your own husbands as to the Lord. For the husband is the head of the wife even as Christ is the heads of the church, his body, and is himself its Savior. Now as the church submits to Christ, so also wives should submit in everything to their husbands." Sounds intense, right? I think the word that often angers or scares people is "submit." Merriam-Webster defines the word "submit" as "yielding oneself to the authority or will of another." Yielding to the will of another, that sure sounds familiar. So often this word

brings negative connotation, yet we do it every day as believers. Are we not commanded to submit to Christ? Ephesians 5 tells us so much about what a Godly marriage looks like, including submission. So why do we struggle doing what God commands of us? Why can't we submit to our husbands? Well, because of pride. There have been so many instances where I have felt like I know better. Often times it is with my husband, but sometimes I'm foolish in thinking I know better than God. Being submissive means giving up my assumption that I know what is best; it means giving up my pride. Marriages are too often based on selfishness. It always seems to be about what he can do for me, or I deserve this. If anything is scarier than the word "submit" I would think it is the word "deserve." We are entitled to nothing, yet we are so prideful in our ways. My relationship with my husband should be an image of Christ. It is supposed to be an example of who Christ is. This includes in public and in the privacy of our own home. We need to be submissive as an act to God, not as an act to our husbands. That means showing love, mercy, and humbleness even when he may not deserve it. Let's be real here, we definitely did not deserve Christ dying on the cross for us. Christ took himself off His throne to suffer for us. His spotless, sinless, beautiful life was sacrificed for our sinful, ugly, deceitful ones.

So as a wife, that means obeying God by being submissive. That means humbling myself before my husband so that I can humble myself before God. We are not asked by our husbands to allow them to lead, we are asked by God. We need to stop confusing our role as wives with what we think we deserve. It cannot be contingent on how our husbands treat us. No, my husband is not perfect. Guess what, neither am I. As scary as the word "submit" sounds, we need to trust in God because He knows what is best for us. Christ is the true image of love and submission. We are called to be like Him. Although we can never be perfect, we can strive to

be as much like Jesus as possible. A Godly marriage comes from taking the focus off your marriage and placing it on Christ.

CHILDREN (OF ALL AGES)

n the dictionary the first definition used to describe children is "a young person". The second definition of children is, "a son or daughter", which seems more accurate in my opinion because the Bible does not define children by age but by being a son or daughter. The Bible says in Ephesians 6:1-3, "Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. Honor your father and mother (this is the first commandment with a promise), that it may go well with you and that you may live long in the land." God calls all children to obey and honor their parents. When a man and a woman leave their parents and become one flesh, they should still have a special respect and concern for their parents even though they are no longer under the authority of their parents. A child who has been raised to obey and honor their parents will always listen to their counsel, wisdom, and advice regardless of them still being in authority. My wife and I do not have kids of our own yet, but when we do, my hope and prayer is that they obey and honor us while they are under our authority and that they will desire our counsel and wisdom when they are no longer under our authority.

God commands us to obey and honor our parents. The command to obey should move children to action. To do what they are told, when they are told to do it. Obeying means that you hear what your parents say and responding with action to what they are saying. Children are to be under the words and authority of their parents. The relationship between children and their parents is a relationship that is supposed to reflect our relationship with the Lord. If children are honoring and obeying their parents, they are painting a picture of their honor and obedience to God. In Colossians 3:20 Paul writes, "Children, obey your parents"

in everything, for this pleases the Lord." Children have no better reason to obey and honor their parents than this! There is no punishment or reward that parents can use to motivate their children more than the motivation that Colossians 3:20 should bring them. Obeying and honoring your parents brings GLORY TO GOD! Honoring and being obedient to our parents is not something that the world has declared as "right". It may be the right thing to do in a moral sense, but the most basic reason to obey our parents is because God calls it right. God's standard and declaration is what makes it right!

When I hear the word "honor," I think of much respect and great value. When children have good, God-honoring parents, it is something that is to be shown much respect and valued greatly. For many of us, our parents have been there, they have trained us in the ways of the Lord, they raised us to love and follow the Lord, they have disciplined us, and they have shown us mercy and grace when we need it. Honor your parents; give them the respect and value they deserve. Children are called to obey and honor their parents. As followers of Christ, we are called to obey and honor our Heavenly Father. Our earthly relationship between our parents and us should display an eternal relationship with Jesus.

PARENTS (DEFINED)

Being a parent is not a duty to take lightly. DESTROYING THE FAMILY

Positive thinking is looking at reality and then finding a solution. We need to understand the reality of how we can destroy the family to learn how to overcome those challenges. Too often we think we need to put on a perfect act. We know your secret. Your family isn't perfect, and neither is mine. While many outside things destroy families, this guide will take us through the ones we struggle with most. In our discussion, we will look at a reality we face and then a solution that God gives us. Positive thinking is because of the Gospel. Jesus dying and rising again for our sins means each mistake we make is covered. Hiding our sin or our struggles is of no value to us.

Danger #1: Me, Myself, and I.

Genesis 3:4-6: But the serpent said to the woman, "You will not surely die. For God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good

and evil." So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate, and she also gave some to her husband who was with her, and he ate.

1 John 2:15-17: Do not love the world or the things in the world. If anyone loves the world, the love of the Father is not in him. For all that is in the world—the desires of the flesh and the desires of the eyes and pride of life—is not from the Father but is from the world. And the world is passing away along with its desires, but whoever does the will of God abides forever.

The problem is you and not me, so we think. To be humble, we think that the problem is due to circumstances, other things beyond our control, and even God Himself. After all, we can't be bad, can we? Genesis 1-11 describes for us how the world became what it is today. While this passage is debated in our culture to its truthfulness, the Apostle John hits on the same theme. Ironically, John's writings are some of the last writings of the New Testament. The pattern we see in the Old Testament, and especially in Genesis 1-11, is people rejecting God. So, if the problem is us, answer this:

Why do people want to run from God?	
Why do you often want to run from God?	

Solution #1: The Gospel

Genesis 3:15: I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and her offspring; he shall bruise your head, and you shall bruise his heel.

1 John 1:5-2:1: This is the message we have heard from him and proclaim to you, that God is light, and in him is no darkness at all. If we say we have fellowship with him while we walk in darkness, we lie and do not practice the truth. But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin. If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us. My little children, I am writing these things to you so that you may not sin. But if anyone does sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous.

We need to often state the obvious: The Gospel is the solution. John wrote his first letter to help those who love Jesus understand how to deal with the sin and brokenness in our lives. While doing this, John points to Jesus as the solution. In Genesis 3:15 we have the first hope of the Gospel. Even when the Bible points out sin, God also points to a way out. John unpacks how the resurrection of Jesus benefits you and me. We don't have to be perfect because Jesus was perfect for us. When we mess up, we have immediate access to forgiveness. We also have a choice on who and what to live for.

Danger #2: Um, I forgot.

Joshua 24:14-18: Now therefore fear the Lord and serve him in sincerity and in faithfulness. Put away the gods that your fathers served beyond the River and in Egypt, and serve the Lord. And if it is evil in your eyes to serve the Lord, choose this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your fathers served in the region beyond the River, or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you dwell. But as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord.

Then the people answered, 'Far be it from us that we should forsake the Lord to serve other gods, for it is the Lord our God who brought us and our fathers up from the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery, and who did those great signs in our sight and preserved us in all the way that we went, and among all the peoples through whom we passed. And the Lord drove out before us all the peoples, the Amorites who lived in the land. Therefore we also will serve the Lord, for he is our God.'

Judges 2:10-13: And all that generation also were gathered to their fathers. And there arose another generation after them who did not know the Lord or the work that he had done for Israel. And the people of Israel did what was evil in the sight of the Lord and served the Baals. And they abandoned the Lord, the God of their fathers, who had brought them out of the land of Egypt. They went after other gods, from among the gods of the peoples who were around them, and bowed down to them. And they provoked the Lord to anger. They abandoned the Lord and served the Baals and the Ashtaroth.

We are forgetful people. Forgetfulness hurts. Jesus' Bible was set up in three parts: Law, Prophets, and The Writings. The Law, or Torah, was God's instruction to us so we could understand how to live in relationship with God. The prophets describe the downward spiral of Israel and their keeping the Law. They forgot God. We forget God too. Clearly, the family is where things fell apart. In our culture and even in our churches "biblical literacy," our knowledge and understanding of the Bible, are at an all-time low. Forgetfulness leads to tragedy in the book of Judges. But, again, in Judges, God provides a way out.

Solution #2: God in your day, not just a part of it

Deuteronomy 6:6-9: And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise. You shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates.

Joshua 24:25-27: So Joshua made a covenant with the people that day, and put in place statutes and rules for them at Shechem. And Joshua wrote these words in the Book of the Law of God. And he took a large stone and set it up there under the terebinth that was by the sanctuary of the Lord. And Joshua said to all the people, 'Behold, this stone shall be a witness against us, for it has heard all the words of the Lord that he spoke to us. Therefore it shall be a witness against you, lest you deal falsely with your God.'

Joshua led Israel to practice what was written by Moses in Deuteronomy. We talk about what is most important to us. We celebrate what is most important to us. We set up reminders about what is most important to us. God knows we are forgetful people. He encouraged us to not forget and gave us a family solution. Joshua knew that we'd be forgetful too, so he set up a monument as a reminder. There is a pattern in Scripture where

God's people intentionally set things up so they won't forget and that their children would ask about such things.

Danger #3: Absent dads

Malachi 4:6: And he will turn the hearts of fathers to their children and the hearts of children to their fathers, lest I come and strike the land with a decree of utter destruction.

The last word from the Prophets is about dads. This is a painful topic for many of us. For single moms, this is a challenging issue as well. The elephant in our culture's room is absent dads. Statistics point to a crystal clear picture of what happens when dads are not present. I use the term dad because one can be a father and not be present even in one's own home. This isn't to say moms are not essential. Moms are essential. The way God made us, dads play a critical role that cannot be replicated. A key marker to restoration and healing is how Malachi ended his book. Fathers need to be

dads. We learn in Malachi 4:6 that Israel's problem was a lack of

aon o dads.

Solution #3: Active Dads and Active Churches

active dads

Ephesians 6:4: Fathers, do not provoke your children to anger, but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord.

James 1:27: Religion that is pure and undefiled before God, the Father, is this: to visit orphans and widows in their affliction, and to keep oneself unstained from the world.

Dads, we need to show up for duty. Dads need to be present not only for our own children but also to help those families where dad is not present. Paul describes being a dad as a nurturing role, not a drill sergeant or referee role. The term "admonish" carries the idea of a "velvet hammer." Pursuing God should be a delight not something that destroys our kids. God understands that life happens. An essential part of being a healthy church is caring for the fatherless. Being a single mom is an incredible challenge and one that should not be done alone. The solution to absent dads is active churches. Think of it this way: A good dad is active in his family. A great dad gets his family to be active in the lives of others.

What does it mean to be an active dad?
How can we help the fatherless? Single moms, how can we help
you?
Why is having our family active in the church so very important?
What should that look like?

Danger and Solution #4: Life is hard, so don't give up!

Galatians 6:9-10: And let us not grow weary of doing good, for in due season we will reap, if we do not give up. So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to everyone, and especially to those who are of the household of faith.

Remember, we don't have to be a perfect family. We just have to keep getting back up and trying again, together, until Jesus calls us home. Family is hard, but the harvest at the end is worth it!

DESTROYING THE FAMILY: DEVOTION 1

CREATION

nd when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was pleasant to the eyes, and a tree to be desired to make one wise, she took of the fruit thereof, and did eat, and gave also unto her husband with her; and he did eat." Genesis 3:6

The flowers are beginning to bloom, trees are making leaves, baseball is being played daily, spring has sprung, and hopefully the dark, dreary icy cold days of winter are becoming a distant memory. As God bestows the beauty of the season upon us all this week, I will attempt to discuss with you in as hopeful and encouraging a way possible the struggles our families have today. The "Destruction of the Family" is a topic ideally designed for a sermon series or a research paper. I have struggled for weeks with how to take it and condense it into a series of daily devotions that provide a few moments daily from God's Word and hopefully some insight into the importance of nurturing our families. Let's look back for a moment to Creation.

In Genesis Chapter 2 God made man from the dust of the ground and put him in charge of caring for His creation. He decided man needed a helper and partner, so He created woman from the man. He made their partnership unique as verse 24 states that man and woman should leave their parents and cleave to one another. No one should be allowed to come between a husband and wife. Prior to sin entering the world, husband and wife were naked and without shame. If you continue to read you know through disobedience and poor choices sin entered the world and we have never been the same.

I have been blessed to serve in our churches for fifteen years as a Pastoral Counselor and have been working with families for over thirty years. I have watched families implode from the same struggles Adam, Eve, Cain, and Abel had that are so clearly described in Genesis. Disobedience, lust of the eyes, lust of the flesh, pride, and envy to name a few were as common then as they are now. As clever as Satan is, and make no mistake he is clever, his strategy remains consistent and is a fairly simple formula for disrupting our families. He is patient and uses our basic sinful tendencies against us to try and separate us from God and then each other. He tries to do this in such a gradual manner that we fail to notice the separation. Think of the old analogy of the frog in hot water and apply it to caring for our families. If you drop a frog in hot water, he will attempt to hop out immediately and aggressively. When your family comes under a sudden attack or crisis, we typically respond aggressively and quickly to protect our loved ones. If you place a frog in cool water and heat it slowly, he will adjust to the temperature until he slowly succumbs to the heat. Similarly, through our own choices, lack of focus, busyness, denial, and stress we tend to not notice our distancing from God that allows the small struggles our families typically have to become overwhelming and lead to disintegrated relationships.

For the rest of the week we will take a closer look at the struggles that undermine the foundation of our families and discuss God's ways of protecting us both from the Enemy and from our own weaknesses. We have all made mistakes and made poor choices but remember, there is no condemnation for those in Christ (Romans 8:1) as Scripture teaches us that the abundance of God's grace is larger than all of our struggles. God has an incredible way of taking our failures and turning them into incredible, faith building opportunities.

DESTROYING THE FAMILY: DEVOTION 2

DIVIDE & CONQUER

he year was 1941 and the world was at war. In one of the first allied military operations of the African desert, 30,000 British troops attacked a 150,000 man Italian army that was supposedly fortified and impenetrable. In five days, at a loss of less than 1900 men the British took 138,000 prisoners and an incredible load of weapons and tanks from a stunned enemy who was decimated by the attacks. How was this possible? By studying the enemy positions, they found weaknesses they could penetrate and cut off the Italian troops from supplies, reinforcements, and communication. The British had implemented the age old battle strategy of divide and conquer.

Satan has patiently studied your habits, choices, and defenses. He knows your weaknesses and most certainly will exploit them at the exact moment he believes you will endure the most harm. He is well aware that many people have been decimated by one impulsive decision they or someone close to them has made. Let's take a closer look at how Satan tries to divide and conquer.

Think back to those times in your life that you have made some of your worst decisions. Decisions that have caused you or others much pain. This may be difficult for you because the results of those decisions may still cause you hurt or shame. Let me help relieve you of those feelings by reminding you of yesterday's final thought. If we remain faithful, God turns those horrible choices into incredible opportunities for growth, teaching, and witnessing. As you remember those difficult moments in your life, think about what your relationship with God was like at that time. If you did not know Christ, then you had no inclination to ask God for discernment and guidance. However, if you knew Christ as

Savior, my guess would be that at the time you made those poor choices you were not maintaining an intimate relationship with Him. Maybe you were "too busy" or distracted, and maybe you did not understand the importance of daily Bible study, prayer, and fellowship with believers. Satan will do whatever he can to keep you from growing spiritually. He knows your weaknesses, and he knows with what to tempt you. If he can separate you from God, he knows you are more vulnerable.

Let's apply this concept to married couples and parents. Separation from God will almost always lead to separation from our spouse. Some may argue their marriage is fine no matter their spiritual condition. However, when we do not value Christ, what do we value? Chances are we are making "things" priorities, not God and our families. I am confident you know by your own or other's experiences what happens when a spouse and or parent chooses the world over their families. Family time and interactions decrease and isolation increases. When parents are distracted, their kids will seek attention and entertainment elsewhere. TV, video games, computers, cell phones, opposite sex relationships, etc. all become priority over talking and spending time together as a family. This scenario plays out daily in many of our homes causing family relationships to become divided, begin to disintegrate, and give Satan a stronger foothold to conquer. However, we can limit Satan's strength by making God our priority and asking Him to help us love and care for our families as He does us. It is never too late to begin the process of overcoming division and rebuilding family intimacy.

SELFISHNESS PART 1

his is how we have come to know love: He laid down His life for us. We should also lay down our lives for our brothers. If anyone has this world's goods and sees his brother in need but closes his eyes to his need—how can God's love reside in him? Little children we must not love with word or speech, but with truth and action." John 3:16-18 (HCSB)

The Bible is filled with references related to the importance of giving of one's self to help meet the needs of others. Truly loving others as Christ loves us requires us to think of others needs before our own. Take a moment to reread 1 Corinthians Chapter 13 and Paul's inspired description of love. It is clear that we tend to fall far short of the standards God has given us for caring for each other. I have no doubt about how much you feel love for your families. How do you measure that love? To what standards are you striving to reach and maintain? Is it clear that you love your family more than you value your own well-being or enjoyment?

Selfishness is a most common theme in the counselor's office when families are struggling. It has developed many different names because let's face it; no one likes to think of themselves as selfish. "We have communication issues", "We don't spend any quality time together", "He or she works so much", "We have some bad financial struggles", "He or she never helps me with the kids or the house", "My feelings or thoughts don't matter", "We fight all the time", are just a few of the initial statements I hear from people that are most often dealing with the selfishness of one or multiple members of a family. After all, selfishness is contagious! See Galatians 6:7-9. Most people who feel their own needs are

not important to their spouse or family will be more tempted to give into one of Satan's oldest cons..."I deserve this", "No one else cares, so I have to take care of me", "He or she does that so I am going to do this", etc. Self-centered thoughts will typically lead to self-centered actions. The more selfish we become, the more distant we are from God. The less sensitive we are to the needs of our families, the more division and isolation. When family intimacy decreases, Satan gains a foothold. It is my belief that more marriage vows are broken due to selfishness than any other of the choices we make.

We can be selfish in so many different ways. Satan has done a masterful job of getting us to tune out the Holy Spirit's guidance related to the importance of caring for our families. In what ways do you struggle the most with selfishness? Are you so focused on work that you bring it home with you or spend more hours than necessary on your job? Has a spotlessly clean house become such a priority that you regularly feel stress and frustration because others do not seem to care or pitch in? Does your leisure/ recreational activities consume so much time and resources that they greatly reduce family interactions? Have the kid's activities caused you to be running in so many different directions that there is little if any quality "marriage time"? Have the things in life you enjoy the most taken priority over spending uninterrupted, fully focused time meeting the needs of your family? These are but a few of the ways we can allow our own self-interest and desires to become more important than the intimacy and stability of our family relationships.

Take a moment today to ponder your schedule, your spouse's attitude toward you, your comfort level with spontaneously discussing any subject with your kids, how many family meals you have together in a typical week, how many activities you regularly

enjoy without any of your family involved, how much electronics are used in your home, how often you and your wife date. These thoughts and many others may give you some important insight into how much selfishness is thriving in your home. Be honest with yourself and know that God is a God of hope and He is excited to help us grow.

SELFISHNESS PART 2

ear ye one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ." Galatians 6:2 (KJV)

The concept is simple but yet so difficult to maintain. Put others ahead of us. It is the ultimate solution to our struggles with selfishness. Did you take a moment yesterday to examine the questions we discussed at the end of our devotion? Did you think of any more measures related to the level of intimacy in your own family? God has made a point in Scripture to prepare us for the battle of pursuing our own self-defined needs versus caring for the needs of our family. It is a difficult battle but a very winnable one. The process of examining our own hearts, taking a close look at the spiritual health of our family, and then studying for a week or so the typical interactions between members will give you great insight into whether or not your family is at risk for separation and the problems that accompany it. Then comes the necessary humility needed to identify the role of selfishness in your family issues, especially if through your self-examination you recognize your own selfish choices.

There is a concept in the world of addictions called "Denial". It not only relates to a person's refusal to acknowledge that they have a problem, but it also relates to their refusal to admit that their problem is impacting other people in their lives. I am spending two days of our devotions on selfishness because I think it is the most destructive of Satan's tactics to harm our families and one of the easiest for us to deny as an issue. We know that no one wants to be thought of as selfish and we have become experts at rationalizing our "busyness". It becomes extremely easy to assume all is well all the time at home. After all, "No news is good news,"

right? Wrong! No news generally means little communication and no quality marriage and family time.

The often-overwhelming trials of daily life including work hours, activities, and maintaining a household are not hopeless. King David of the Old Testament had many struggles, but he knew the formula for overcoming his selfish flesh was to invite God to "examine his heart" (Psalm 26:2). He knew he had to allow God to guide him through his own sinful tendencies. Remember Jesus' response to the Pharisees in Matthew 36 when He was asked, "What is the greatest commandment?" He first stated that loving God with all of our heart, soul, and mind then in verse 39 He said, "And the second is like it, love thy neighbor as thyself". If we cherish others the way we are supposed to, selfishness is defeated. Practically speaking, the deliberate and daily acts of caring for your family members need to be a priority over everything in your life but your walk with God. You set the example, and I believe your family, over time, will begin to reciprocate. Here is the coolest part of all, when selfishness starts to decrease, communication increases. When communication increases, scheduling, planning, and organizing increases. When scheduling, planning, and organizing increases all activities are more efficiently managed creating more time and resources. If you have more time and resources, you may be able to enjoy your favorite leisure time activities more frequently without causing the resentment and anger that created the original division in your family.

What is the worse case scenario of identifying and changing your own selfish ways? What if no one in your family follows your example? What if they try to take advantage of your new selfless heart? Remember, you are still glorifying God by reflecting Christ! There is no better place to be in this world to be than deeply

embedded in the will of our loving God. Truthfully, selflessness is just as contagious as selfishness.

DESTROYING THE FAMILY: DEVOTION 5

now this, my beloved brothers: let every person be quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger; for the anger of man does not produce the righteousness of God." James 1:19, 20

James understood long ago the hurt we can cause each other by the misuse of our words and the failure to control our tempers. Scripture is filled with warnings in regards to the danger of our tongues and anger. (See Psalms 34:13, James 3:5, Hebrews 4:12, Colossians 3:21, Proverbs 20:2, 16:32, 20:2, 19:19) Our words can be used tenderly to calm, encourage, nurture, and love. Calmness, in the face of disappointment has a similar ability to encourage and strengthen others.

Satan also knows the destruction our tongues and anger can cause. In his continued efforts to divide and conquer our families, he has encouraged us to ignore the power of our words and our temper. He understands and enjoys the hurtful, discouraging power of criticism, sarcasm, negativity, and dishonesty in our words. He knows that raised voices, harsh responses, snarling facial expressions, and clenched fists can trigger similar aggressive responses from some and frighten others into physical and/or emotional isolation. Satan is so cunning that he tempts us in such a subtle manner that we may be convinced that our negative words or behaviors are rational or even necessary. When he encourages us to justify our angry words or actions, it makes it easier to ignore self-control and develop the habit of regularly treating others poorly. Consistently using hurtful, discouraging words and failure to control anger can destroy any family quickly.

For years now I have watched and listened to people cut each other to shreds in my office. Yes, Christian people who tear the hearts out of each other and their children and then try to rationalize why they do it. The aggressor's reasoning is almost always an attempt to explain that either the other person deserved it or that they (the aggressor) cannot help the way they act. I believe people spend more energy excusing their behavior than it would take to change it!

Parents that mistreat each other through their words and anger create kids that mistreat each other in a similar manner. It is very sad to watch a husband or wife deny that their behaviors are affecting their children. Over and over I have watched children disrespect and disobey the parent that is the victim of that same disrespect from their spouse. Your kids are watching you and your greatest influence comes not from what you say but how you act.

Yesterday we mentioned King David's approach to being who God wanted him to be. David had many struggles and many of those struggles were self-induced, but he had an incredible way of always finding a reason to be grateful to God. (See Psalms) Like David, we need to put all the excuses behind and ask God to help us examine our hearts. Some of you have endured some horrific situations and are scarred by that past. I do not want to minimize those hurts. Our family of origin and childhood environment however, do not make us act in any particular way. That background leaves us with tendencies. We still must choose everyday what our attitude and treatment of others will be. For my friends that struggle with negativity and anger, let's try to refocus our hearts on all that we have for which we can be grateful. It is difficult to be nasty with a grateful heart. Start right now thanking God for the specific blessings you have and begin each day with the same grateful heart. I know the stress

is high, the worries can be overwhelming and irritability thrives when the world bears down on us, but I also know God has us in His loving arms. Positive words, peacefulness, and gratefulness defeats Satan's plans and will strengthen the bonds of your family in incredible ways.

DESTROYING THE FAMILY: DEVOTION 6

INHERITANCE

his is love: Not that we loved God, but that he loved us and sent His son as an atoning sacrifice for our sins. Dear friends, since God so loved us, we also ought to love on another." 1 John 4:10,11 (NIV)

It is truly an amazing example of love that God has given us. His son, mocked, tortured, and gruesomely murdered for our salvation. The challenge is to take that example and share that love to the world through our own actions. Jesus made it clear to His disciples in John 13 that the world will know we are His disciples by our love for each other. We need to place our family in the center of our desire to love as Jesus stated. We often give so much to work, friends, recreation, and even ministry that our own spouse and children are frequently left fending for themselves. The hypocrisy a family witnesses when a parent or spouse gives more loving attention to others, or to their own selfish ambitions, builds incredible walls of division.

This week's discussions of family division and isolation, selfishness, an unbridled tongue, and explosive anger are but a few of the ways today's families are being destroyed. We did not have time and space to discuss appropriate Biblical roles, parenting issues, blending families, lack of accountability, and addictions to name a few more of the situations that can cause pain and destruction. The potential dangers of each of these choices and behaviors are well documented and the associated battle plans are provided throughout Scripture. If you are unsure how to find the help you need, reach out for help. You have a church family, including staff

members, who would love to help you find God's plan for healing and growth.

Today I want to leave you some encouraging ideas for possibly knocking down some walls and rebuilding or strengthening relationships in your own family. I have read many books related to healthy families and the following thoughts and suggestions have been developed from many great authors as well as Scripture. I have always been fond of James Dobson, Kevin Leman, John Trent, and Gary Smalley and I recommend their many books on parenting and family. As we close out the week, consider these ideas for building closeness.

Establish, discuss, and enforce healthy boundaries. Kids draw security from rules that are established with love. Remember the old saying – Rules without relationship leads to rebellion. Discipline must be an act of love.

Limit electronics. On top of the isolation electronics encourage, they are also dangerous. Television is constantly promoting self, sex, and worldly lifestyles. The internet is exposing more children to pornography than we ever thought possible. Your kids will have enough struggles in life without the added stress of these horrific philosophies and images in their heads.

Increase praise. You will always have to correct your children but catch them doing right. They will strongly desire to please you.

Share feelings. Ask open-ended questions to encourage thoughtful answers and conversation. Tell me about your day versus how was your day? I am also reminded of a story told by Trent and Smalley in their book, The Language of Love, about a woman who convinced her husband she and the kids needed more interaction from him. Each day upon returning from work he said little, grabbed his

dinner plate, and plopped in front of the TV for the night. She told him he reminded her of a man that ate at nice restaurants every day. He ate steak, seafood, and pasta. After each meal he took the leftover crumbs and brought them home for his family to share. That's all they got. She made her point and hopefully he understood his family needed more from him.

Demonstrate humility. Share your mistakes and poor choices with your family. You will blow it sometimes. Own it and take responsibility for it. A heartfelt apology in the spirit of repentance, making eye contact, asking forgiveness are all messages of 'I love you'.

Share family choices. Most of the time parents will decide the course of family activities but when prudent allow the kids to have input and actually decide how your time will be spent. There is nothing better than watching a "macho man" on the floor playing with dolls or my little ponies.

DELIVERING THE FAMILY

ne of my good friends went to work for a moving company. Basically, his job was to pack an entire house into a truck to deliver the items to another location. After a 10-hour workday, my friend decided he was not cut out to be a part of the delivery service.

Delivering our families from the hurt, pain, and suffering of the world is actually a far more difficult mission than delivering furniture from one house to another. As the world rapidly changes and imposes itself on our families, how can we help to defend, and deliver the family to bring glory and honor to Christ? Today we will look at what the Word says about delivering the family.

Ephesians 6:1-4

Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. 2 Honoryour father and mother (this is the first commandment with a promise), 3 that it may go well with you and that you may live long in the land.

Why does it say it is right?	

Colossians 3:20
Children, obey your parents in everything, for this pleases
the Lord.
Why do you think it pleases the Lord for children to obey their parents?
Deuteronomy 6:4-9
Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. 5 You

to maturity, to nourish". It's more than just a "drop off." It's a				
process where we bring them along for the ride in this sometimes				
crazy, yet exciting Christian life.				
What things hinder you from bringing your child up in the Lord				
(sin, time, job, laziness, TV, lack of patience, guilt, etc.)?				

Just a simple FYI, your kids know you are not perfect. Sometimes, however, we try to make them think we are. When all is said and done, they don't need perfect parents, they need real parents who

are fighting to follow Jesus and will do whatever they can to bring their children along for the ride.

Dads, you have POWER. Please understand this, you have power; you have RESPONSIBILITY. You have the weight of your family on your shoulders. God has placed you at the head of the family. Please let that sink in... it is not a light responsibility, it is heavy. I thought about going in a lighter direction with this devotion, but honestly, the responsibility is too big to miss the chance to see what God expects of fathers... it begins with you.

Ephesians 6:4 says, "Fathers, do not provoke your children to anger, but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord." Let's break this up into two sections.

"Fathers, do not provoke your children to anger...." I always took the "do not provoke your children to anger" pretty literal. So my parents should not make me mad, that is what I thought growing up. Mom, Dad, you are making me angry so you must be doing something wrong. Let's dig a little deeper, with what that looks like. The Matthew Henry commentary says this, "Though God has given you power, you must not abuse that power, remembering that your children are, in a particular manner, pieces of yourselves, and therefore ought to be governed with great tenderness and love." They are pieces of yourselves so take care...I love that. God is telling us, hey listen, you need to lead them but do not be so harsh that you injure them emotionally so that they

become embittered toward you because they are a part of you. Kids are looking to their dads to lead them, and God is asking fathers to lead them with love. This does not mean that you do not lead them at all and avoid any conflict or difficult situations, but lead them with wisdom and godliness.

"...but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord" I've never been more thankful for my dad, than when I first started mentoring and counseling women (kids, teens, and adults). Many and I mean many of their insecurities, their decisions, and their heartbreak were a direct result of their relationship with their fathers. Some realized that, but many just sat there struggling with their life and didn't understand the connection. Sons and daughters struggle connecting with their Heavenly Father because they lack a connection with their earthly father. Daughters need to be told they are loved, they need to be protected, and they need to know that their earthly father believes they are unique, beautiful, lovely, strong, wise, and worthy.

It is the same with men. Sons need to be told that they are loved. They need to be protected and taught to protect. They need to be led and taught to lead. They need to know their earthly father believes that they are unique, strong, wise, and worthy. If they get that, if they believe that, their ability to stand in the embrace of their Heavenly Father and seek their identity in Him is immeasurably stronger. They become men and women of God who find their worth in their Heavenly Father; there is no stronger person than that. This pleases our Heavenly Father. This is how we can deliver or redeem the family. Continually pointing our kids to God, and continually finding our strength in Him.

Men, just because you may not be a father or your kids are grown or have unique situations only known to you, God is going to give you opportunities to step into people's lives that may not have

fathers or may need a strong male influence in their lives. This applies to you too, don't waste those opportunities, pray that God brings those people into your lives and point them to the Heavenly Father.

Be intentional with your actions, your words, and your instruction. God will honor that, and our families will be changed for the better because of it.

was in a car accident years and years ago; I had a bad case of whiplash and some bruises but nothing that even sent me to the hospital. hildren, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. Honor your father and mother (this is the first commandment with a promise), that it may go well with you and that you may live long in the land." Ephesians 6:1-3

Parents and kids... it is a complicated relationship. One deeply affected by our own shortcomings. God calls us, as sons and daughters, to obey and honor our parents. Obey and honor fallible human beings. That is tough. That is made even more difficult because we, as kids, are fallible human beings. How can we do that when we struggle with honoring a perfect God? If we cannot honor a perfect God, how can we honor imperfect people? Is it too simple to say because God commands us to do it? God commands us to do it!

Recognizing that our parents are imperfect makes it easier to honor them. I think we have some high expectations for our parents... we do not allow them to be imperfect. We need to remember that they are people trying to do the best they can. Sometimes their best is seriously inadequate, but when have

we been perfect in any of our relationships? See, honoring has nothing to do with what our parents have done but all about God's command. In honoring our parents, we are honoring God. Even when our parents are not worthy of honor, we honor because God has given us immeasurably more, and we do not deserve it, and yet He gives.

Next time we have our moments where we are annoyed with our parents, moments that they mess up, moments that hurt us... we honor them because God honors us by loving us, forgiving us, and providing for us.

Psalm 1:2 "But his delight is in the law of the Lord, and on his law he meditates day and night."

Deuteronomy 11:18-20 "You shall therefore lay up these words of mine in your heart and in your soul, and you shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. You shall teach them to your children, talking of them when you are sitting in your house, and when you are walking by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise. You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates."

DEFENDING THE FAMILY: DEVOTION 1

VIGILANT

hroughout the past couple of weeks, we have been emphasizing the importance of the family - using our Growth Communities, devotions, workshops, and sermons to draw each of us to the heart of God and to clearly see His design for the family. God created the family as a daily, tangible display of His glory.

This week we will be looking at the reality that the creation of the family is under attack, but that, more personally, each of our families is under attack. Without question, each of us has experienced pain in our family, whether in divorce, abuse, unresolved conflict, harsh words, death, neglect, an affair, and a host of other painful events and circumstances. With that in mind, we need to be extremely aware of the truth - we have an enemy. As the family is a living, breathing display of God's glory, our enemy fundamentally despises this beautiful truth and seeks to destroy it. In John 10:10, Jesus says, "...the thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy."

We have an enemy and we, according to Scripture, must be armed and prepared for a battle with him. As I write this devotion, I am truly devastated to look back on all of the families that I have seen fall under the barrage of attacks Satan leveled against them. I have seen some restored by the power and grace of God, but many, many lay in ruin.

In 1 Peter 5:8, a much wiser and more seasoned Apostle Peter warns believers to "...be sober-minded; be watchful. Your adversary the devil prowls around like a roaring lion, seeking someone to devour."

1. Be sober-minded

The instruction here is to think clearly and rationally. In the Greek (which the New Testament was written in) the idea is to be safety-minded. So many times we become inebriated with the cares of this world and the distractions of life, that we stop thinking clearly. We simply forget that we have an adversary... an opponent...an enemy. Imagine an athlete who prepared for the biggest game of his career only to be so distracted by the cheers of the crowd and the immense size of the stadium that he simply stood frozen in the middle of the field or court as the game went on around him. Too often I see in myself and other Christians this distracted, foggy thinking. We must never forget to be soberminded.

2. Be watchful

In the King James Version of the Bible (in which I grew up memorizing Scripture) the word is "vigilant." The word simply means as it is translated in the English Standard Version, to be watchful, specifically watchful for possible danger. We live in the country on a very low traffic road. It is quiet and beautiful. I remember the first time I had one of my kids go across the street to get the mail. The likelihood of a car coming was relatively small, but not impossible. So I gave clear instructions about looking both ways and being very focused. Apparently, I was extremely convincing, and I watched out the window as my child refused to cross the street. At first, I thought fear had overcome her, but then I realized that she was waiting for a car. However, the car was so far down the road, and she could have crossed the street countless times before the car reached our driveway. That visual of my patiently waiting, vigilant daughter still makes me smile.

We are to be the same way. We are to look for danger constantly, not just when crossing roads or sending our kids to the bathroom, but

spiritually. This is often so neglected that parents are surprised when they raise a safe, healthy, godless child. The adversary is cunning. Be watchful.

3. You have an enemy

The Scripture likens the adversary to a prowling lion, seeking his prey. Don't wait until it is too late to act. Read Ephesians 6:10-20 and do what the Lord says, specifically pray. Each night I pray with my kids before they go to sleep. I ask God to protect them, and I ask that each of them would grow to love and serve the Lord their whole life. Yes, I hope my kids are intelligent, successful, athletic, happy, and so forth, but above all else; I want them to passionately love and follow Jesus. I realize there is an adversary I am fighting, and he is not going to find easy prey at my house.

Over the next few days, my wife, Jennifer, and I are going to share with you some of the ways that we have defended our family from the variety of attacks that Satan has brought against us. I would love to tell you that we triumphed in each case, but that would not be true. We have experienced both victory and defeat...triumph and tragedy. Our prayer for you is that you will learn from Scripture and from the wisdom of those who have gone before and truly defend your family against our adversary.

DEFENDING THE FAMILY: DEVOTION 2

HYPOCRISY

here are many different ways that we can guard our family. We do not go certain places because we want to keep them safe. We may even carry a gun because we feel safer. We have our kids wear elbow and knee pads when skating, helmets when riding their bikes, and nets around trampolines are a must. However, this is not the type of guarding I am talking about. The type I am talking about is spiritual. One the biggest ways in ministry we see people undermine the spiritual safety of their family is in the area of hypocrisy.

Over and over we watch families implode because they are experts at putting on a good face. They come on Sundays, Wednesdays, and even lead ministries in the church. They know how to smile and pretend that life is great. When in reality, their life is falling apart. Their marriage is rocky, at best. Their kids are not obedient. They are on the brink of financial ruin, battling addictions, and the list can go on forever. Are you this person, sir? Ma'am? Are you a hypocrite in your family? If you are a hypocrite, your kids know it, your wife knows it, your husband knows it, your parents know it, and your friends know, too. Are you a different person at home than when you gather with the church?

Jesus warns us about hypocrisy over and over again in the New Testament. Ever heard of the Pharisees? The Pharisees looked and acted the part. They pretended. However, Jesus says they are like "white washed tombs" because the inside did not match the outside. One of the most poignant verses is in Matthew 23:13, where Jesus says to this group of pretenders, "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you shut the kingdom of heaven in people's faces. For you neither enter

yourselves nor allow those who would enter to go in. Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you travel across sea and land to make a single [convert], and when he becomes a [convert], you make him twice as much a child of hell as yourselves." So what does this verse mean? If you are a hypocrite, you get in the way of people around you being saved. You are a hindrance to the gospel going forth.

Hypocrites go to great lengths to maintain their image of perfection on the outside (verse 15). When you train another person to be this way, they are "...twice as much a child of hell..." as you are. That is terrifying! I do not know about you, but I do not want to be the cause of that for anyone in my life.

So, what do we do to not be a hypocrite in our family? Here are six ways to guard against hypocrisy.

- 1. Be real. Get in a Growth Community where you can share your hurts and struggles. We are meant to do this following Christ thing together.
- 2. Be real. My house is a disaster 90% of the time, but that is where I am at in life. However, I do not let that stop me from being hospitable and having people over. (And 50% of the time I'm in pajamas and haven't showered...ok...probably more than 80%, who am I kidding?)
- 3. Be real. Our lives are not Pinterest-perfect. Stop pretending that they are. Life is messy.
- 4. Be real. If you talk nicely to people when we gather as a church, then talk nice to your family all week long.

- 5. Be real. Make your inside match the outside. Jesus said in Matthew 23:26, "You blind Pharisee! First, clean the inside of the cup and the plate that the outside also may be clean."
- 6. Be real. Read God's word and pray. The Holy Spirit will reveal to you whether you are a hypocrite and in what areas. Saturate your heart in God's Word.

DEFENDING THE FAMILY: DEVOTION 3

MORALITY

arly in 2014, my family and I began a relatively simple home improvement project that quickly turned into a home remodel that then descended into an entire sceneby-scene replay of the movie The Money Pit. My wife recently made me watch that movie again. Honestly, it was not a comedy for me at all. It as a horror movie...a nightmare I have been living. When we started tearing up flooring, we found that over the nearly 150-year history of our house, eight layers of flooring had been put down on top of each other in the kitchen and dining room (tile, linoleum, wood, particle board, plywood, etc.). When we got through the drywall, we found plumbing problems, framing that was missing, HVAC and electrical issues, and beyond all that, a multi-generational, epic mouse infestation. When we bought the house, we knew we were in for some remodel work, but the outside and the surface of the home did not look too bad. Little did we know, there were some "lovely" surprises lurking just below the surface.

In 2nd Timothy chapter 3, the aged Apostle Paul is writing to his son in the faith. Timothy is a young Pastor in the city of Ephesus, and from the implications of the letter, is facing some pretty serious exterior opposition and some internal problems in the church. Paul warns this young Pastor, saying, "...understand this that in the last days there will come times of difficulty. For people will be lovers of self, lovers of money, proud, arrogant, abusive, disobedient to their parents, ungrateful, unholy, heartless, unappeasable, slanderous, without self-control, brutal, not loving good, treacherous, reckless, swollen with conceit, lovers of pleasure rather than lovers of God...." (2nd Timothy 3:2-4). Some very serious warnings from

the heart of Paul, but the next phrases are haunting. Paul says of these people (those who are fulfilling this prophecy of the last days and behaving in such sinful ways) that they will have "...the appearance of godliness, but denying its power." The veneer looks godly, but the core is rotten.

The group of people that Jesus addressed most pointedly and preached against most often was the Pharisees. However, many of the men who were part of this group were the most morally upstanding citizens of Israel, yet they were spiritually lost.

There are many things that we as leaders and members of our family must protect against. One of the most deceptive and appealing schemes of the devil is morality. Now initially you may disagree with that, but realize that moral people without Jesus Christ are still lost and avowed enemies of God. Theodore Roosevelt said, "To educate a man in mind and not in morals is to educate a menace to society." However, I would humbly add, that to just educate and create a moral society promotes simply, as Paul writes, "...the appearance of godliness." Many times as parents, we strive to have children who are moral and at the core our motives are not wrong, just misguided. We do not want our children to do drugs, have sex, drink, hang with the wrong crowd, and so forth. What we end up working towards is a moral exterior ("appearance of godliness"), but we innately deny the transforming power of the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Our goal as parents, leaders, and influencers in our family should not be simply to develop moral children, nephews, and nieces. Our goal must be to demonstrate in our own life the inside-out transforming power of Jesus Christ. The Spirit of God changes us, beginning with our motives, thoughts, and desires. Then and only then, will our behavior truly change and be governed by the

gospel. When we have rules or have to give correction, we must have both of our feet firmly planted on the authority of the Word of God. When we pray for our family, let's pray not simply for good behavior, but for salvation and a transformation that only the Holy Spirit brings.

TECHNOLOGY

ow many hours a day do you spend plugged in? If you are anything like me, it is more than you care to count. Whether it is for work, school, boredom, or you are just checking in with the world. Our lives revolve around it. Paying bills? Online. Looking for a vacation? Online. School? Online. Meetings? Online. Shopping? Online. News? Online. Bible? Online. Selling your house? Online. Look for a spouse? Online. Find a doctor? Online. Games? Online. TV? Online. Movies? Online. Pictures? Online. Music? Online. My list could go on for a mile. I think you catch my drift.

One of the things I try and guard my family against is the amount of time we spend plugged in. I actually have a "no technology allowed at the table" rule, (and my kids don't even have phones or iPods) so really it is just for my husband and me. It is so easy to be distracted by what is happening in the world. When really I should be so engrossed in what is happening at my dinner table that the thought of things happening outside of my dinner table should not even be a blip on my radar. My daughter is 11, realistically how many more dinners are we going to have together? They are dwindling before my eyes. So I care more about what's happening on Facebook, Yahoo, CNN, or Sports Center? How embarrassing. I think we collectively need to get our faces out of screens and participate in the lives going on around us. James 4:14 says, Yet you do not know what tomorrow will bring. What is your life? For you are a mist that appears for a little time and then vanishes. What are you doing with your "little time?" Checking your messages, texting, staring at a screen that will never give back the amount of attention and time you gave it? You

have a family sitting around you dying for ¼ of the attention you are giving that screen.

Remember two things...

- #1. I say this in love. I care about your families and don't want to see them destroyed by this distraction.
- #2. I've already said all of these things to myself. The Holy Spirit convicts me just like He does you. So do not think I have it all together. Just ask my children; they will tell you the honest truth.

Now the other subject I want to broach, what is on your screen? One thing Josh and I have been very guarded on is what we let our kids see. We do not have TV or the internet in our house. Now we have TV's, but we watch movies on them. We feel that we can better control what they see with movies because we already know what is on them. Compared to television not knowing what new episodes are going to say or show them. The commercials in between are not better. I do not want my son or my husband being subject to the trash that comes on these days. Once certain images go into their brains, it takes an act of God to remove them. This is a major sacrifice for both of us. I mean my husband is a Godly man, but he is still a human man who likes his sports and news. Growing up, my dad was a TV repairman. I think at one point in our home we had 11 televisions! So it is not like we are super spiritual or anything, but like I said we are very guarded on what their eyes see. For years, I did not take my kids to the grocery store (even still it is a rare occurrence) because of all of the inappropriately clothed women on the magazines at the checkout aisle. We had to train our kids to guard their eyes. There are certain things the world says is okay to look at, that the Word of God strongly disagrees with. It was not worth sacrificing their young hearts and minds to those images. On your devices at home, what is on them? Your kids know. They know what is on

your phone, what type of TV shows you watch or movies you bring into your house. Are you helping guard your eyes and theirs? Proverbs 6:27 says, Can a man carry fire next to his chest and his clothes not be burned? Don't think you can consume your life and your family in technology and not get burned?

If you have any questions about this or ideas of how to implement some safeguards in your home, please ask! Remember we love and care about your family and only want you to succeed in this crazy task of raising a Godly family.

UNBIBLICAL PRIORITIES

or nearly ten years, Jennifer and I were heavily involved in children's ministry. We look back on those years with a great deal of affection and gratitude. Whether sharing camp stories, VBS memories, or amazing spiritual growth in the lives of those amazing kids, we are beyond thankful for those years. However, I would be deceiving you if I pretended that those years only held perfect memories. We are, without being too dramatic, haunted by some of the faces of those kids. We think back to foster kids we saw for only a short time. We wonder and talk about them from time to time. We also pray for them, never knowing what life brought to them. We think about the kids who moved away because of divorce or a job change. We think about kids who have passed away. We think about others who took their own lives. We are reminded of their smiles and their energy. We hear their laughter and remember their little voices. There are truly some great moments and others we just can't get out of our heads.

There is no way in 500 or 600 words that I could dissect, or attempt to explain everything that happened in each of those situations. It is simply impossible. However, I will give you the most common mistake that we witnessed in families. We saw it in poor families and rich families. We saw it in "church" families and those who were first generation Christians. We saw it in families of different races and every different background. The issue was simply having unbiblical priorities.

I saw families completely abandon raising their children "...up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord..." for travel sports, vacations, money, education, work, dance, and a myriad of

other eternally meaningless pursuits. Before we continue, please know those activities and pursuits are not, in and of themselves, sinful. However, when they become GOD of the home, checkbook, and schedule, something is fundamentally wrong. Moreover, this principle is true of families with grown children or now children. I have seen first-hand the destruction of families who crown another god in their home other than the GOD of the Bible (See Exodus 20:3).

Jesus said, "...seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you" (Matthew 6:33). Jesus is teaching on the fact that we become anxious about what we will eat or wear. I have heard so many families worry and become so anxious about careers, houses, money, cars, vacations, college, and so on. Jesus clearly teaches in verse 32, that our "...heavenly Father knows that you need them all." God knows what we need. Our homes need to be filled with a great trust of God and a great pursuit of HIS righteousness and HIS will. When we align our lives and our homes with the will of God and the desires of God, we will find that our desires and pursuits fundamentally change and begin to align with the joys, desires, and will of our Heavenly Father.

Here are a few questions to ask:

- 1. What's the most important object your family owns?
- 2. What's the most important pursuit that your family has?
- 3. What does your family spend the most money on?
- 4. Are your priorities in line with God's Word?

HAVE A PLAN

e have plans for just about everything: Retirement plans...financial plans...house plans...schedules... vacation plans...educational plans...healthcare plans...insurance plans...birth plans...wills and trusts... landscape plans...fire escape plans...disaster plans...and the list, as you can see, goes on and on.

What about a parenting plan?

I remember hearing some incredibly profound advice before Jennifer and I had kids. I do not remember the context or the teacher, but he referenced children and Genesis 2:24. The Scripture says, "...a man shall leave his father and his mother and hold fast to his wife, and they shall become one flesh." I vividly remember the speaker saying, "The moment your child is born, the leaving begins." I have no idea what he said before that or after, but I sat stunned. I was sad, scared, and shocked by this profound truth so clearly shown in the Scripture. Whether you have just had your first child or your first great-grandchild... whether you've become an aunt or uncle for the first time or the 40th time, you and I realize the brevity of life. The pace at which time goes by is staggering. Nowhere is that more clearly displayed than in the lives of the next generation. So, what's the plan?

Let's be rather simple for a moment. The moment your child, grandchild, niece, or nephew is born, the leaving begins. Not only does the leaving begin, but also some certain events and rites of passage are coming, whether you like it or not. Crawling, walking, talking, running, pre-school, school, puberty, dating, brokenhearts, questions about where babies come from and how they are

made, college or career, homecoming, prom, sports, peer pressure, and millions of others things, some of which will be specific to your child and your situation. Don't be surprised that these things are coming. We know it. So again, what is your plan?

My wife and I are constantly amazed at the fundamental lack of planning and communication that families, particularly parents, have when it comes to these normal and expected markers in life. There are no perfect parents, so please don't think that we are putting ourselves on any sort of pedestal. But before our children were born, we had a plan. We talked openly about discipline, education, names, and how we would handle the question "where do babies come from?" I'll never forget when my wife told me about when our 4 and 5-year-old daughters asked how babies got out of Mommy's belly. Even funnier, I'll never forget the look on their faces when they got the answer. I am not saying that our philosophy and plan needs to be yours exactly, but do you have a plan? Have you talked about what you are going to do for school, friends, boyfriend/girlfriend issues, the sex talk, puberty, and entertainment choices?

Our advice to you: start talking and praying together as you develop a parenting plan rooted firmly in God's Word.

Here are some things that my wife and I committed to before the kids were born:

1. We will not lie to our kids

Whether they ask us about Santa, sex, or world news, we do not lie. We recognize that some language and topics are beyond a certain understanding, so we answer age appropriately and follow up as they mature. See James 5:12.

2. No promises...Lord willing

We do not promise or pinky-swear. We use the phrase "Lord willing." Not because we are super spiritual, but because we want to demonstrate daily to our children that our plans are always in submission to God's plan. If He wants to change plans, we are good with that. See James 4:13-17.

3. We fight the division that our kids naturally want to create in our marriage

Children are brilliant manipulators. They love to play one parent against another. If they see even a slight hint of division, they will exploit it. See Genesis 3:24, Matthew 19:5, and Ephesians 5:31.

4. How to handle conflict within a family of seven

I hate tattling (unless there is an injury). Ironically, so does God. Essentially, tattling is gossip. We will not let our kid's gossip to us about another one of our children. So we have taught them the principles of Matthew 18. See Matthew 18:15-16.

5. Empty nest is coming

One day our children will move out and move on with their lives. We know this. Some days this reality makes us cry, other days we dance when we think about it. Either way, it is coming, and Jennifer and I cannot neglect our relationship until then. So we take a week to ten days near the beginning of each year, to get away together...just the two of us. WE LOVE THIS TIME. I jokingly will say that it reminds us each year that we really do like each other. Throughout the year, we try to make date nights very important. We do not want to wake up one day and not know each other or care for each other. A good marriage is a daily, living display of the gospel. See Ephesians 5:32 and 1 Corinthians 7:2-5.

am currently reading "The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe" to my son. We just read about Edmund's encounter with the great White Witch. The Witch offers Edmund Turkish delight, a dessert based on a gel of starch, sugar, and a little magic, to lure him in under her command. Immediately, the Turkish delight sets the hook and begins a wild ride of difficult events for Edmund and his siblings.

Titus 3:8: The saying is trustworthy, and I want you to insist on these things, so that those who have believed in God may be careful to devote themselves to good works. These things are excellent and profitable for people.

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The dictionary defines delight as "a high degree of pleasure or enjoyment." The Bible says that we have to be careful how we devote ourselves. What we delight in will have a tremendous impact on where our family goes and what they believe.

Genesis 19:1-26: The two angels came to Sodom in the evening, and Lot was sitting in the gate of Sodom. When Lot saw them, he rose to meet them and bowed himself with his face to the earth 2 and said, "My lords, please turn aside to your servant's house and spend the night and wash your feet. Then you may rise up early and go on your way." They said, "No; we will spend the night in the town square." 3 But he pressed them strongly; so they turned aside to him and entered his house. And he made them a feast and baked unleavened bread, and they ate.

4 But before they lay down, the men of the city, the men of Sodom, both young and old, all the people to the last man, surrounded the house. 5 And they called to Lot, "Where are the men who came to you tonight? Bring them out to us, that we may know them." 6 Lot went out to the men at the entrance, shut the door after him, 7 and said, "I beg you, my brothers, do not act so wickedly. 8 Behold, I have two daughters who have not known any man. Let me bring them out to you, and do to them as you please. Only do nothing to these men, for they have come under the shelter of my roof." 9 But they said, "Stand back!" And they said, "This fellow came to sojourn, and he has become the judge! Now we will deal worse with you than with them." Then they pressed hard against the man Lot, and drew near to break the door down. 10 But the men reached out their hands and brought Lot into the house with them and shut the door. 11 And they struck with blindness the men who were at the entrance of the house, both small and great, so that they wore themselves out groping for the door.

12 Then the men said to Lot, "Have you anyone else here? Sons-in-law, sons, daughters, or anyone you have in the

city, bring them out of the place. 13 For we are about to destroy this place, because the outcry against its people has become great before the Lord, and the Lord has sent us to destroy it." 14 So Lot went out and said to his sons-in-law, who were to marry his daughters, "Up! Get out of this place, for the Lord is about to destroy the city." But he seemed to his sons-in-law to be jesting.

15 As morning dawned, the angels urged Lot, saying, "Up! Take your wife and your two daughters who are here, lest you be swept away in the punishment of the city." 16 But he lingered. So the men seized him and his wife and his two daughters by the hand, the Lord being merciful to him, and they brought him out and set him outside the city. 17 And as they brought them out, one said, "Escape for your life. Do not look back or stop anywhere in the valley. Why do you think Lot and his family were so uncommitted to following what the angels said?
Hebrews 11:8: By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to go out to a place that he was to receive as an inheritance. And he went out, not knowing where he was going.
How did Lot's brother (Abraham) respond to the Lord in Hebrews 11:8?
How was the response so different?
After the angels/men save Lot and his family, he still doesn't follow their instruction. I found this rather annoying, and then I started to think about myself. God, through Jesus, saved my life just like He saved Lot's life, yet sometimes I don't commit myself to the things that God says. Instead of delighting in His ways and trusting Him, I delight in the ways of the world.
What do you think it means to delight in the world?
Is this a good or bad thing?

Does your family ever see you delighting in the world?
Psalms 37:4: Delight yourself in the Lord, and he will give you the desires of your heart.
Psalms 37:23: The steps of a man are established by the Lord, when he delights in his way.
Does your family ever see you delighting in the Lord?
What do those things look like?

So often, I see Christians who only delight in the world, and unfortunately, this is what their families witness. I watch parents make things such as sports, work, grades, and appearances the only thing they delight in as a family. They spend their money, time, and effort in these delights and then wonder why their family is always looking back to the world. It is so important for Christians to delight in the Lord and the direction He has for us. This is how we will truly delight the family.

ehold, children are a heritage from the Lord, the fruit of the womb a reward" (Psalm 127:3 ESV). Children are a heritage from the Lord – even a reward. The Message Bible (which is a paraphrase) says, "Don't you see that children are God's best gift? The fruit of the womb his generous legacy?" Basically, children are a gift from God. and no razor shall touch his head.' She knew the blessing that comes with children and wanted to delight in a child. After Samuel, we read that God blessed Hannah with three more sons and two daughters.

I like being a dad. I like going through life with my children looking for teachable moments. Deuteronomy 6:4-7 says, Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might. And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise.

These verses inform us of the responsibility we have in raising our children to love the Lord. It also implies that this is done through living life together. Delight in your children. There are different stages and personalities that can push our buttons, but beneath it all is a gift from God that wants to be loved.

DELIGHTING WITH GRANDPARENTS

o forget one's ancestors is to be a brook without a source, a tree without a root" (Chinese proverb). I believe part of the downfall in American culture is the mobility of the family. On the average, families move about every four years. This leaves grandparents behind. It also limits their influence of wisdom, love, and bluntness. My grandparents were allowed to say things that no one else could get away with.

I lived across the street from my maternal grandmother until I was 22 (my grandfather had died when I was four). Grandma was always there. She always was watching me and letting me know she was praying for me. She was very clear about whom I shouldn't date and whom I should marry. I listened. Whenever I had a friend over, she witnessed. At times I was embarrassed of the situation, but always proud of her. I miss her.

Timothy had the same kind of spiritual heritage: I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that dwelt first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, dwells in you as well. (2 Timothy 1:5). We need godly grandparents, and we need to delight in them.

My other set of grandparents only lived about two miles away. I would see them a couple of times a week, but they were homebodies and chose not to really get involved in our daily lives. To an extent, we lost out. However, my grandmother's philosophy was, "If mother says no, ask grandmother." We never left her house without feeling loved and with something (apple, cookie, etc.) in our hands. It reminds me of the Italian parable, "If nothing is going well, call your grandmother."

Comedian George Lopez gets serious when he says, "I had a very difficult childhood. I was surrounded by people who had both parents, which made me feel different. Having a bit of a rougher existence early on, it made me appreciate the work ethic that my grandparents instilled in me." Have you taken the time to see the good in your grandparents?

The Book of Ruth details an accurate account of a struggling family. Due to a famine, Naomi leaves homeland with her husband and two sons. The boys marry foreigners. Her husband and sons die. It is devastating. One daughter-in-law goes back home while the other chooses to stay with her and move. Naomi changes her name to Mara (which means bitter). I can understand her being bitter. Her daughter-in-law remarries and gives birth to a son. When Obed was born, she regained her glow. They again called her Naomi.

Grandparents helped create our foundation. We need to delight in them.

Billy Graham said, "The greatest legacy one can pass on to one's children and grandchildren is not money or other material things accumulated in one's life, but rather a legacy of character and faith."

was raised in a Christian home. My parents lived what they believed. The concept of a loving Heavenly Father is not hard for me to grasp as I still have a loving earthly father. Jerry Falwell said it well, "When you have a godly husband, a godly wife, children who respect their parents and who are loved by their parents, who provide for those children their physical and spiritual and material needs, lovingly, you have the ideal unit."

Not everyone has my story. The Book of Esther focuses around a girl who has been taken from her hometown, parents, family, and friends. She only has one key relative in her life, Mordecai. Mordecai becomes her father figure. He believes in her and encourages her to try to become Queen. Later, he warns her of danger. He is watching out for her. Finally, he challenges her to do the right thing. Mordecai loved her like a daughter. He believed in her, encouraged her, watched out for her, and even challenged her. He even showed tough love. Do you have a parent figure you can delight in?

Finally, God offers us adoption. He wants to adopt us. Romans 8:15 says, "For you did not receive the spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received the Spirit of adoption as sons, by whom we cry, 'Abba! Father!" Galatians 4:4-5 adds,

"But when the fullness of time had come, God sent forth his Son, born of woman, born under the law, to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons."

No matter what your journey has been, you can have God as your Father. Romans 10:9 says, Because, if you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. John 1:12 makes it clear, But to all who did receive him, who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God.

t an early age, I realized that it is not wise to break up a fight between brothers. They will both turn on you. Remember: Blood is thicker than water. The Kardashians seem to be in the news regularly. Their name might even create some emotions in us. However, they seem to know how to appreciate and delight in their siblings. Kim said, "Having lots of siblings is like having built-in best friends."

One of the most famous Bible stories involves David and Goliath. Everyone quickly gets to the punch line of the underdog conquering the overwhelming favorite. However, there are some interesting details within the story.

First, why was David, a shepherd, at the battle site? 1 Samuel 17:17-18, And Jesse said to David his son, 'Take for your brothers an ephah of this parched grain, and these ten loaves, and carry them quickly to the camp to your brothers. Also take these ten cheeses to the commander of their thousand. See if your brothers are well, and bring some token from them.' David was helping take care of his brothers.

Second, why did David take five stones? Did he not trust God with just one? 2 Samuel 21:18-22 lets us know that Goliath had four brothers. Possibly, David considered the bind between siblings and thought he ought to take a stone for each of them, just in case. Genesis 34 records the time Dina was violated and her brothers came out and took matters into their own hands.

We need to take time to delight in siblings. I remember when I was in 5th grade and my little sister was in 1st grade. I was told

a 6th grade boy pushed her down. Now, I must confess I teased her regularly and I am sure had pushed her down before, but no one else was allowed to. I challenged the boy. As I went to push the boy, I accidentally stepped on his foot and he fell hitting his head. I became legendary. I beat up a 6th grader with one punch.

Hopefully, you take time to reach out to your sibling(s). No matter how distant we might appear, we have each other's backs. It is a sibling thing.

Proverbs 18:24 is quite radical in saying, *A man of many companions may come to ruin*, *but there is a friend who sticks closer than a brother.* That Friend is Jesus. He is always with us. Hopefully, you personally know this Friend because now you have brothers and sisters.

Go to a church gathering this weekend and hangout with your brothers and sisters.

elighting with in-laws? Or is it outlaws? Maybe you think it should be delighting in spite of in-laws? Mark Twain has fun with the topic: "Adam was the luckiest man in the world. He had no mother-in-law." Even Hubert H. Humphrey jokes, "Behind every successful man is a proud wife and a surprised mother-in-law."

In-laws are important. I have spent a lot of time reminding my children that you marry a family, not a person. This can be an amazing blessing. Angela and I are blessed. Our in-laws would be our friends even if they weren't our relatives.

There is a Jewish proverb that says, "One of life's greatest mysteries is how the boy who wasn't good enough to marry your daughter can be the father of the smartest grandchild in the world."

Maybe we need to stop for a moment and realize that God crossed our paths for a reason. We can learn from each other and get insight into taking on life's challenges.

Earlier this week, I shared the story of Naomi from the Book of Ruth. Ruth stayed with her mother-in-law and became greatly blessed because of it.

Matthew 8 tells how Peter asked Jesus to come and heal his mother-in-law. Don't let your mind wonder, she actually had a fever and was sick. She was important to Peter.

Another Bible story about in-laws occurs in Exodus 18. Verse 17 says, *Moses went out to meet his father-in-law and bowed down and kissed him.* And they asked each other of their welfare and went into the tent. It appears they have mutual respect and interest for each other. The next day, Moses goes back to his regular routine of being the counselor and judge for everyone. It consumes him from sunrise to sunset six days a week. Verse 17 is right to the point, *Moses' father-in-law said to him*, 'What you are doing is not good.' Because they had a healthy relationship Moses' father-in-law, Jethro, could challenge him. Moses learns the art of empowering others and delegation. Israel is stronger and Moses avoided burnout.

Let's be radical Christians, delight in our in-laws. Maybe, we could even brag about them?
